LEARNING ACTIVITIES

PAINT on the easel with a paintbrush together. What happens when you try to mix blue and yellow together? What about red and yellow? Red and blue? Afterwards, have your preschooler **WASH** their hands at the sink with soap and water. (Language + Math + Physical Development + Social Emotional)

CREATE an outline for your preschooler's name on a piece of paper. Using glue and pom-poms, work together to **TRACE** letters and **IDENTIFY** each one. (Literacy + Physical Development)

Ask your preschooler to **GATHER** up a pile of ten (10) pom-poms and **ORDER** them from smallest to largest. **COUNT** them once they are ordered and note the number. (Math + Physical Development)
